
Today, when med spas can be found on every corner and cosmetic procedures abound on social media, this advice is especially pertinent. At Hall & Wrye, surgeons are seasoned and board certified while nondoctor staff receive an average of \$7,000 to \$10,000 yearly toward ongoing training. This benefits patients across all three practice areas: elective cosmetic procedures, including breast, body, and facial procedures; reconstructive procedures like breast and facial reconstruction; and med spa and hair restoration procedures.

Leading the practice is Wesley Hall Jr., M.D., who founded Hall & Wrye with fellow board-certified surgeon Scott Wrye, M.D.—both doctors graduated at the top of their class from medical school. Dr. Hall's reasoning for pursuing plastic surgery is twofold: He comes from a long line of surgeons on his paternal side and his mother, who is an artist, passed down the creativity he finds to be crucial in reconstructive and cosmetic procedures.

"There are things about our bodies that can affect how we feel about ourselves," says Dr. Hall. "Whether it's for a child who has had a severe dog bite to the face or someone who wants to remove excess skin after pregnancy, my goal is to improve their self-image."
